#### SAVE THE DATE!

Chicago 2021: Great American Stamp Show co-hosted by the American Philatelic Society, the American Topical Association, and the American First Day Cover Society is scheduled for August 12-15 in Chicago, Illinois. The APS will be monitoring the COVID-19 pandemic in early 2021, should any lingering impacts prevent an in-person show. Visit the GASS website for updates.

February – Pressing Issues: An Introduction to Printing Types - This three-session course will meet - February 1 & 15 and March 1 (7:30 – 8:30 p.m. Eastern Time) Instructor: Wayne Youngblood - It is vital to proper stamp identification, as well as for rooting out fakes, to know how stamps are printed. This three-session course will cover the basics of stamp printing technology. This includes the four main types of printing used for virtually all stamps, as well as some design considerations and the use of color in multicolor printing (without going into color theory). Although useful for almost any collector, material is somewhat

U.S.-centric. A liberal amount of time will be spent online engraving and lesser time on the other types of printing.

Getting the Most Out of the Scott Catalogue - This two-session course will meet – March 8 & 15 (7:00 – 8:15 p.m. Eastern Time) Instructor: Ken Martin - Knowing how to use a stamp catalog effectively helps every collector make better informed buying and selling decisions. During this two-session virtual learning course, you will explore the differences among the Scott Standard, the Scott U.S. Specialized, and the Scott Classic Specialized catalogues and how to get the most out of the resources found in each. Attendees will also learn to decipher catalog organization, examine country entries, and interpret item listings. This course will help you to use a stamp catalog with more confidence and enhance your enjoyment of the hobby.

# Minutes From Our Last TWO Zoom Meetings

## Minutes for Nov. 17th, 2020

Vice President, **Phil Russell**, opened the virtual meeting with 19 members and visitors on Zoom.

**PROGRAM:** The program was given by **Rob Faux.** He presented Postal History Featuring the 24-cent 1861 Issue of the United States and he used many excellent examples of covers from that period.

**SECRETARY'S REPORT:** We have 49 members and tonight we welcome our newest member, Noah Beitler.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:** Bruce Marsden continues to work on trying to contact a past president who needs to sign off on our records to satisfy the requirements of Federal Gov. and the bank that we want to use to open our new account. After several failed attempts to reach him, hopefully we now have his correct address and **Steve K.** mentioned that he may have his current email address as well.

OLD BUSINESS: Everyone present reported having no problems with using Zoom for our virtual meetings so far. Bruce reviewed how he thinks last month's Zoom Bombing happened during the meeting and how to avoid it in the future. Members are urged not to pass the Zoom link which they receive onto other clubs which may post it on their club websites. Such info posted on websites leaves it available to others who can misuse the information.

**NEW BUSINESS:** It was noted in the APS newsletter on Nov. 16th that the APS Education Dept. is offering a virtual seasonal program by Florence Wright on Dec. 7th. Since we cannot have our Annual Holiday Dinner this year, several of us thought it would be appropriate to show this video at our Dec. 15th Zoom

meeting if it is available to us. **Bruce Marsden** is looking into this and it sounds promising for Dec.

**Steve Kennedy** mentioned that he would be willing to create a website for our Club if we are interested in moving in that direction in the future.

**SHOW & TELL:** Alan Warren described the cover that Phil Russell illustrated in the November newsletter. It was a registered cacheted cover postmarked during the National Stamp Exhibition held in New York in February 1934. The cover had the imperf pane of 6 Little America stamps (Scott 735). It was not a first day cover, but it had a cachet used on FDCs that was made by Leo August, who founded Washington Press with his brother Samuel. The pane of six 3-cent stamps correctly paid the 3-cent first class letter rate plus 15 cents for the registry fee. Bruce Marsden showed us a scan of a cover mailed from Doylestown to London to the American Exchange in Europe and he share the research that he had done on what the American Exchange was and what the original building houses today.

**Steve Kennedy** showed a scan of an old cover and talked about scanning books.

**Steve Washburne** discussed sales of stamps on eBay verses independent sales to repeat customers.

**Noah Beidler** described his progress in organizing the accumulation of stamps which he inherited from his great grandfather's brother. He showed us the albums which he is using and mentioned that he is using Ez-Stamp for identification purposes. Discussion followed with our members offering advice and encouragement to this new collector.

Vince has more Holiday themed postcards in his collection and also some posted on a site called Stamp-O-Rama, which calls itself "A stamp club for people who love stamps".

**TOM GEIGER** showed us a Ben Franklin stamp from the early 1900's which he found on a piece of junk mail. He also told us about his project to scan much of what is in his binders and to cross reference much of his collection.

**Bruce Marsden** told us that he enjoys learning the social history of those whose names he finds on covers and postcards. He said it is very easy these days to research these names from the past.

# Gone, But Not Forgotten ...

Two "local" postal historians died recently. Although they were not members of our club, they were major contributors to the field of postal history.

## Chester M. Smith

Chester M. Smith, Jr. died December 4 at age 85 in Pine Grove Mills, Pa. He wrote about the postal history not only of Pennsylvania but also New Jersey, New Hampshire, Vermont, Illinois, Maryland, and New York. He compiled the list of subject headings used by the American Philatelic Research Library.

As a computer scientist he compiled indexes of postal history journals. Smith coauthored with John Kay the definitive work on Pennsylvania postal history on the post offices and first postmasters 1775 to 1994.

Born in Vermont, Smith obtained degrees in geology, mineralogy, and petrology and taught at Penn State University for 37 years.

# Sidney Fingerhood

Sidney Fingerhood of Bryn Mawr died December 20 at age 94. He was a clerk on the New York & Washington Railroad and contributed articles on railway post offices, especially in the journal of the Mobile Post Office Society. He also served as mail-bid director for MPOS. Sid was a life member of the U.S. Philatelic Classics Society and received the local merit award of the Pennsylvania National Stamp Exhibition in 1999.

He was a founding member of the Pennsylvania Postal History Society. In addition to RPOs he collected naval covers and Judaica.
