


were interested in stamps, but what really turned him on was a class trip to the post office where the postmaster gave each child an envelope with a stamp on it.

Our newest member is Kenneth Miller, from the Pittsburgh area. He is fairly new to collecting and heard about our club through the APS.

Kenneth has fond memories of visiting his grandfather as a child on holidays and going through his grandfather's stamp collection with him. After his grandfather passed away, the collection was passed around the family and eventually came to Kenneth. This collection mostly held stamps which were the current issues of the 50's and 60's. Especially appealing to Kenneth were those stamps which featured the National Parks.



Others have picked up stamps for Kenneth when they traveled, including his mother who brought back some from Pitcairn Island.

Kenneth mostly collects sheet and plate blocks, getting some of his material from the only stamp store left in Pittsburgh. Of high interest to him are more current issues featuring art, music and theater, such as those honoring Ray Charles, August Wilson, Joni Mitchell, John Lennon, Ma Rainey, and the 1994 Legends of American Music Jazz and Blues series. Remembering Owney

On one cool fall evening in 1888, clerks at an Albany, New York, Post Office were so busy they didn't notice a stray puppy curled up on a pile of old mailbags. Once they did, they adopted the pup and named him Owney.

It's been suggested that Owney may have been the dog of a former postal clerk who brought him along on his walk to work. When his owner moved away, Owney stayed at the post office, as he seemed to have an unusual fascination with the mailbags. In fact, Owney had such a fondness for mailbags that he rode with them as they were transferred from the Albany Post Office to the railroad depot.

Owney eventually started traveling with the mail to New York City. After a while, he would be gone for months at a time. The railway mail clerks considered him a good luck charm. He rode the rails at a time when train wrecks were common, but in his nearly 10 years of travel, he was never in a wreck.

To ensure their friend made his way home, the Albany clerks gave him a collar inscribed "Owney, Post Office, Albany, New York." They attached a note to his collar asking employees of the Railway Mail Service to fasten leather or metal baggage tags to his collar to record his travels. They soon realized Owney was traveling around the country. Owney's collar became too heavy for him to wear, so Postmaster General John Wanamaker gave him a special jacket to display his many tags and badges.

Owney's adventures took him all across the country and around the world. In 1895, he rode the trains and steamships to Asia and across Europe. Reportedly, the Emperor of Japan gave him two passports and several medals. By the time he came home, he was famous around the world. Over the years, Owney received 1,017 souvenirs from his travels.

After 11 years of service as the US Railway Mail Service mascot, Owney the Postal Dog died on June 11, 1897, in Toledo, Ohio.
