Early Christian ---> Byzantine ---> Romanesque ---> Gothic ---> Renaissance ---> Baroque ---> Modern Christian Art



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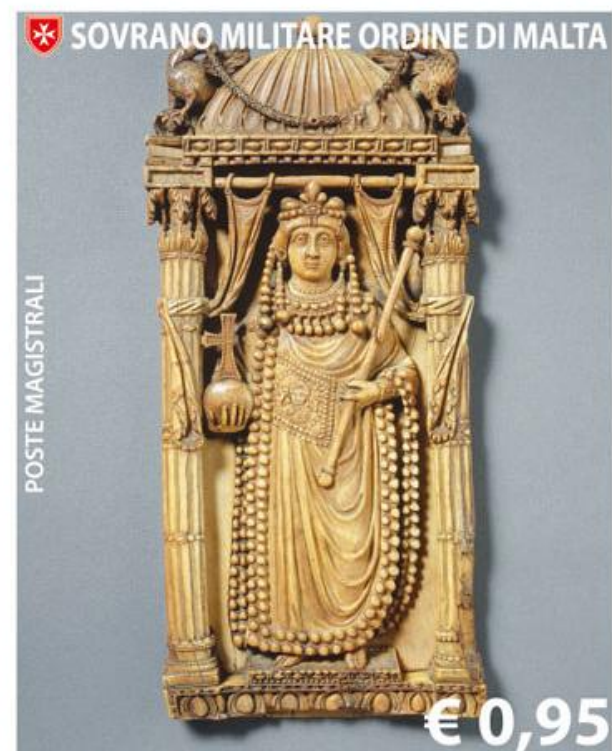
Early Christian Art (2nd to 6th Century)

AN EMPHASIS ON ICONS

Byzantine Art (4th to 15th Century)

Icons were seen as windows into heaven rather than merely paintings

- Archangel Michael, Virgin Mary, Christ





ARCHITECTURE IS FROZEN MUSIC

GOTHIC & ROMANESQUE

Real-life Example: Gargoyles, Northern France



Romanesque (c.1000- 1200 & Gothic (c.1150-1500)

“the Bible in Stone”

Key Points- Romanesque:

- **Architecture:** Thick walls, rounded arches, massive towers
- **Painting:** frescoes with strong outlines
- **Sculpture:** reliefs on portals & capitals
- **Manuscripts:** richly decorated biblical texts
- **Visual Character:** heirarchical, symbolic, monumental

Key Points- Gothic:

- **Architecture:** pointed arches, ribbed vaults
- **Stained glass:** enormous windows & rose windows
- **Sculpture:** naturalistic figures, expressive faces
- **Painting:** greated depth, emotion & human interaction
- **Themes:** Madonna & Child, Crucifixion, Saints, The Passion
- **Visual Character:** vertical, luminous



RENAISSANCE PERIOD

A period of European art & architecture between the early 14th and early 16th centuries in different regions, demonstrating a conscious revival and development of certain elements of ancient Greek, Roman thought and material culture.

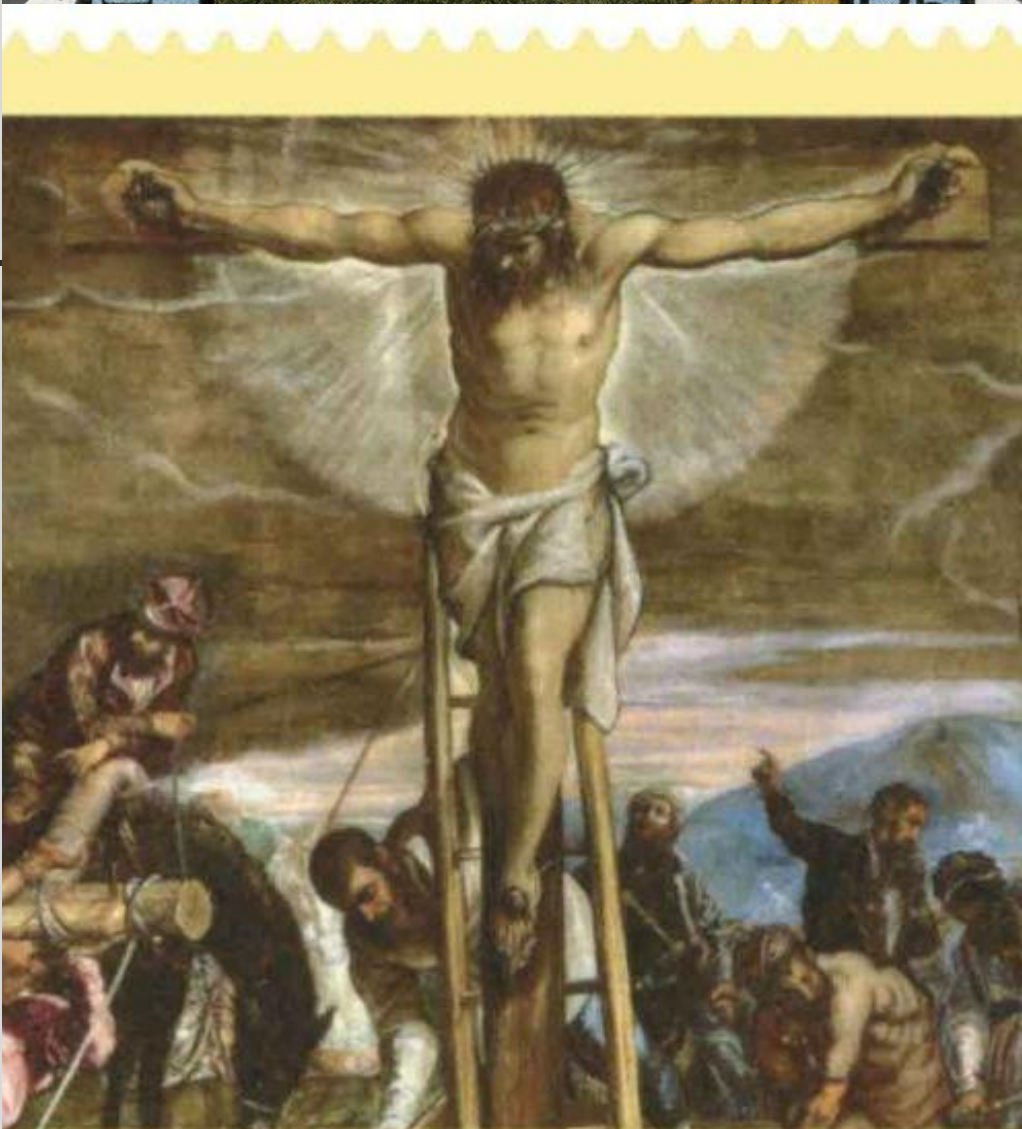




Renaissance (The Human & the Divine)

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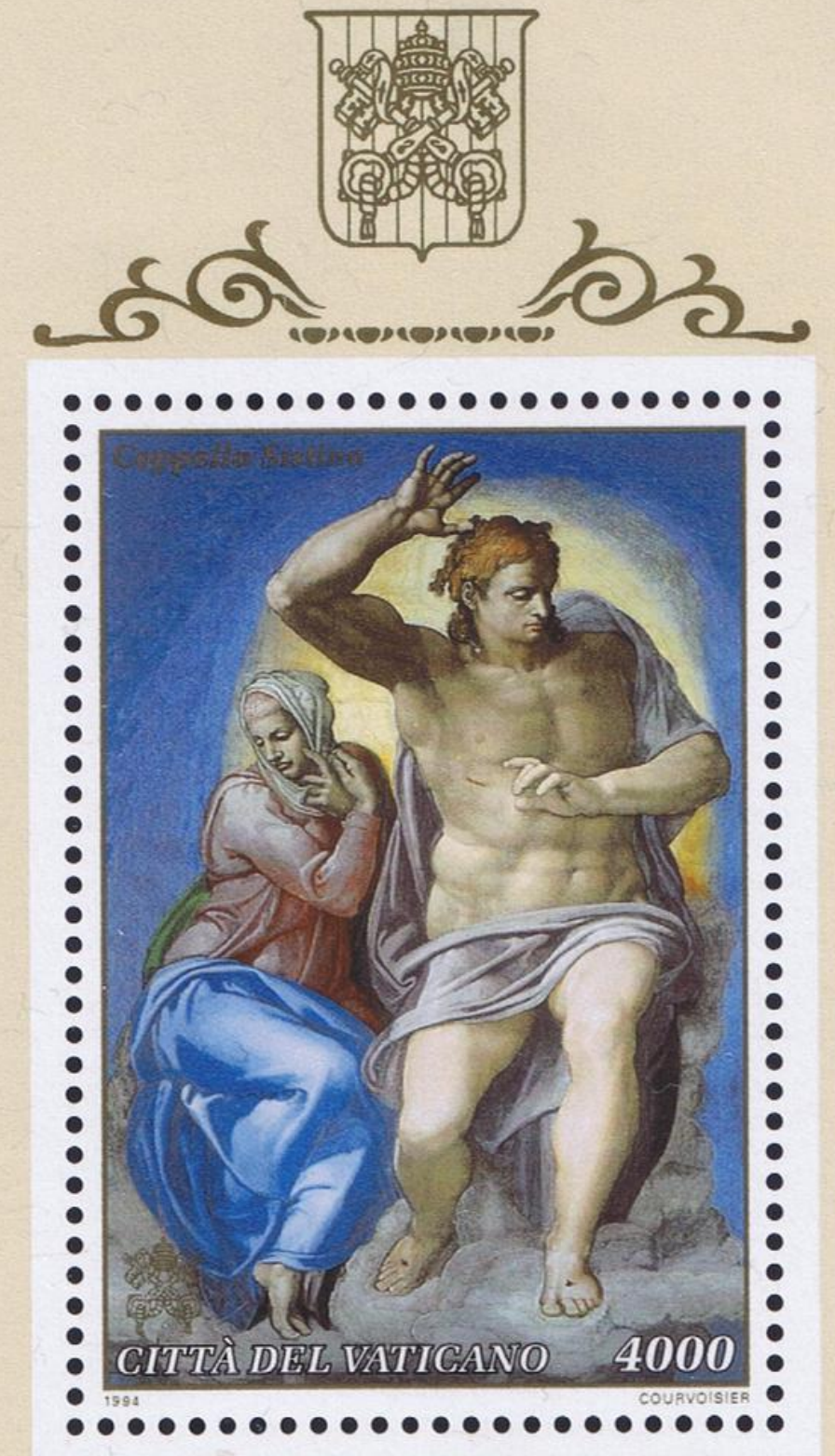
The Renaissance brought a renewed interest in the human figure, classical antiquity, perspective, and naturalism. Christian subjects remained central, but artists increasingly explored the physical and emotional humanity of their subjects.

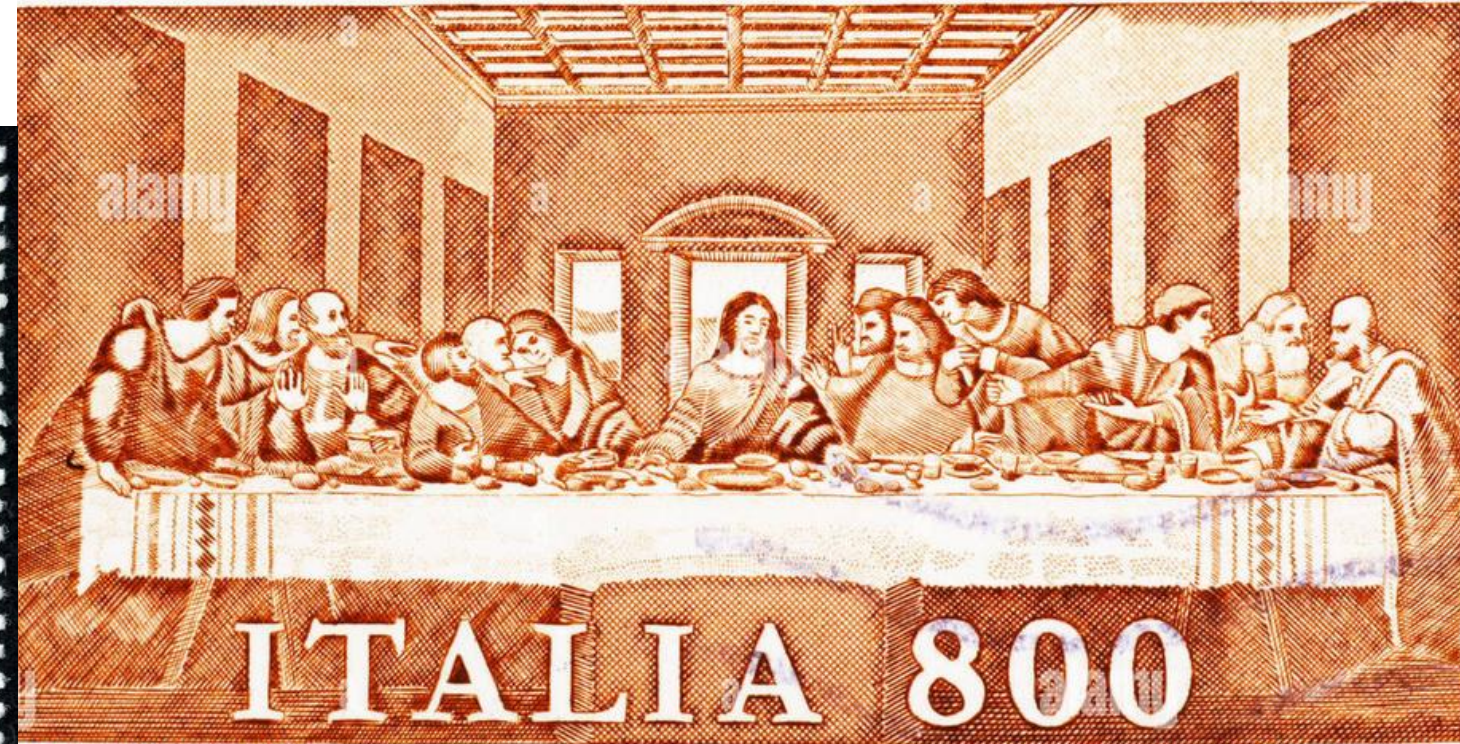

Key Points:

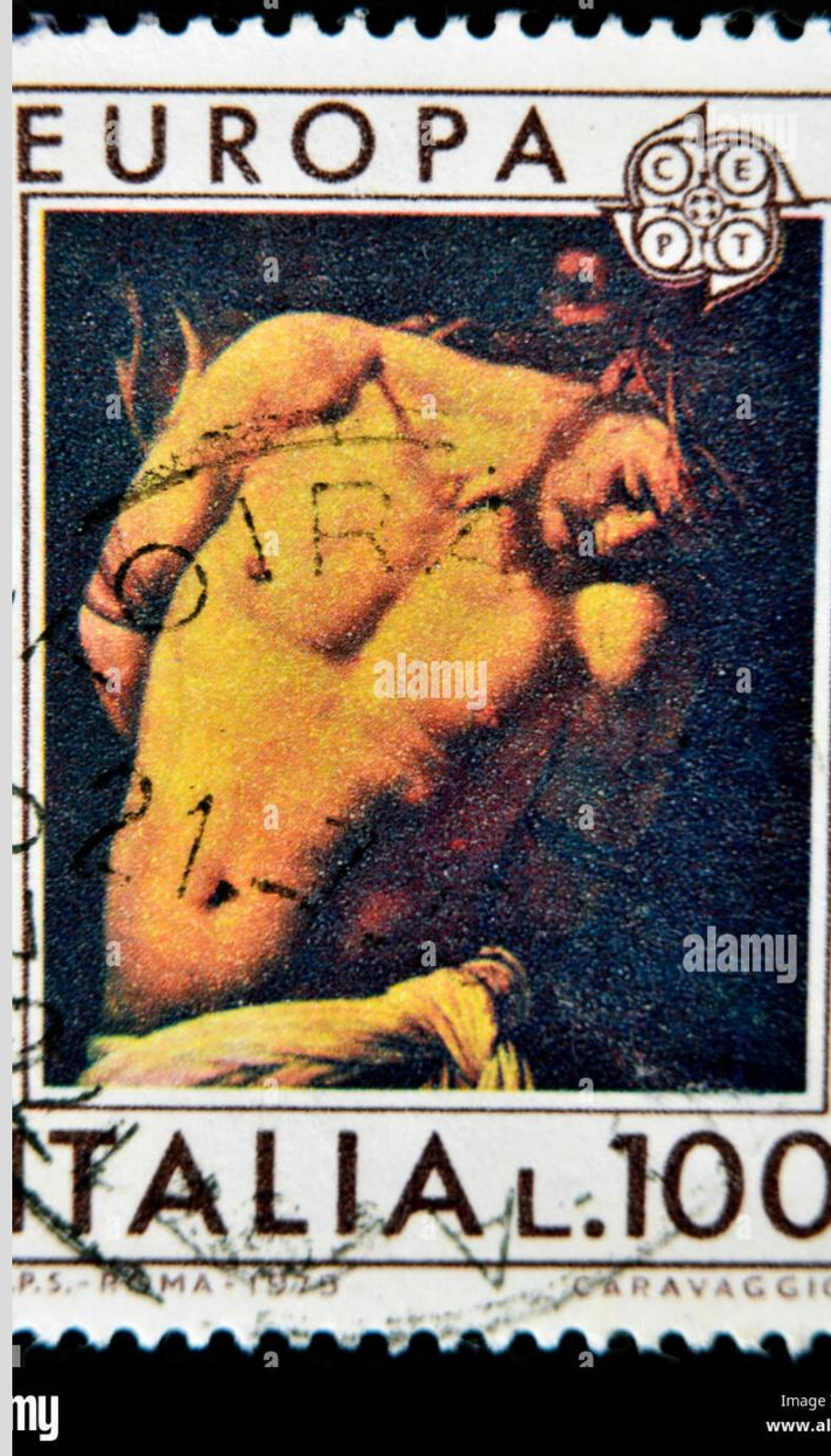
- Increasingly Theatrical
- Drama and movement
- Emotion
- Play of light and shadow
- Monumentality

Important Artists:

- Caravaggio
- Bernini
- Rubens
- Velazquez
- Rembrandt

Themes to look for:

- *Ecstasy of St. Teresa*- Bernini
- *Calling of St. Matthew*- Caravaggio
- *The Conversion of St Paul*



Modern Christian Art

“Ancient Faith, New Expressions”

Key points:

- Abstract forms & simplified imagery
- New interpretations of Christ, Mary & Biblical stories
- Movement away from strict realism

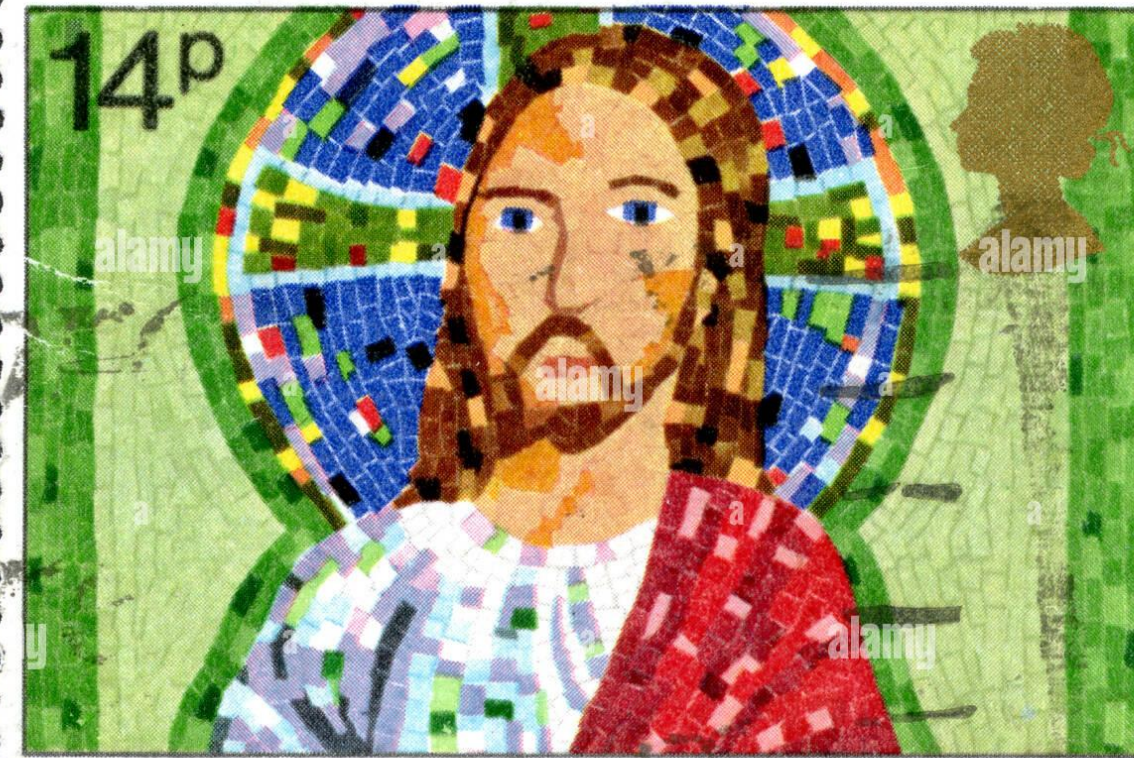
New materials & techniques:

- Modern stained glass
- Mosaic
- Concrete & contemporary church architecture
- Printmaking & graphic art

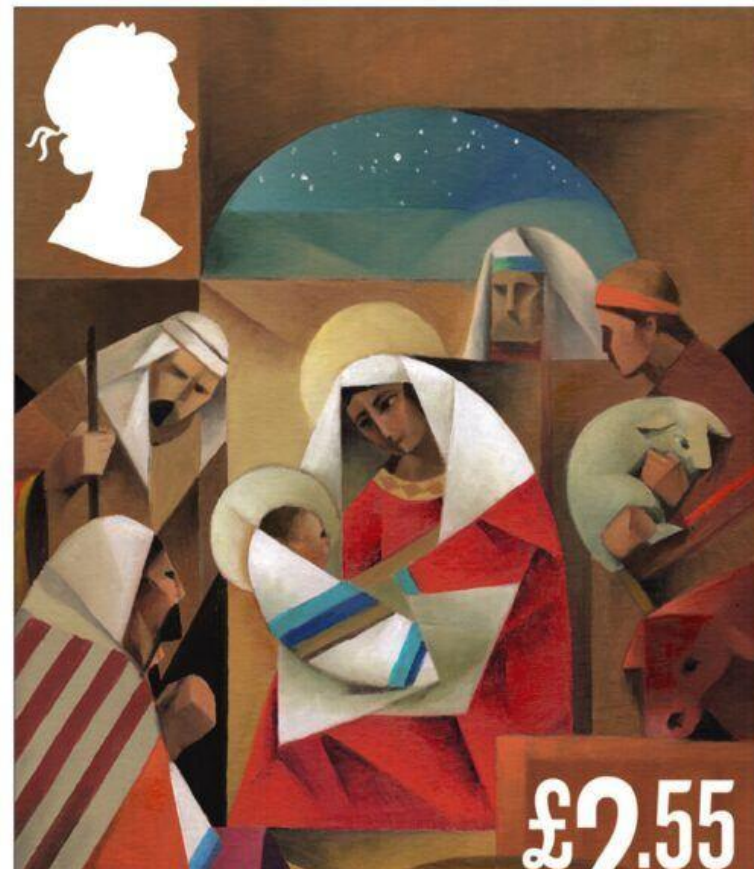
Faith across cultures:

- African, asian, Latin american, middle eastern- more diversity
- Christianity expressed through local artistic languages
- Blending traditional Christian imagery with indigenous forms
